Those materials were: 2" X 2" 16 ga Sterling silver sheet 3" X 3" 20 ga copper sheet 3" of square brass tubing 10 brass escutcheon pins 4" brass lamp band 3 vintage buttons 5' 20 ga sterling silver round wire



This year we switched things up and allowed TWO "wildcard" items to the mix instead of just one and we also introduced THEMES. Participants had to choose from 1 of 3 themes: Art Deco, Egyptian, or Steampunk.

All submissions are in and the pieces will be on display June 24th, 2018 from 10-12 during the Jewelry Challenge Luncheon, which (in case you've never been) is one of

our most fun and interactive events. While socializing and enjoying some tasty appetizers, attendees get to vote on their 1st, 2nd, and 3rd favorite entries for the people's choice awards of \$300, \$200, and \$100 respectively. McCreight in 2014. The goal is to assist jewelers with limited resources through the collective strength of the metalworking community and to create new connections worldwide.



CLASP - 4000 years of Fasteners in Jewelry by ANNA Tabakhova / reviewed by John Rose

Very likely the most beautiful and comprehensive book on the subject of clasps ever produced. Author Anna Tabakhova has meticulously researched, photographed and illustrated a sumptuous study of her subject that is at once an art book, historical research and technical manual.

Clasps is far beyond the usual collection of step-by-step "how to" projects. Presented here is a concise history of clasps and their development. Detailed illustrations and close up photos of historical ex-


amples show how the clasps were fabricated and how they work. Shown and revealed are the inner workings of some of history's most enigmatic clasps and closures from ancient times up through modern ateliers.

Tabakhova has organized her subject with working jewellers in mind. Each section of the book groups clasps by type so the book is a fast reference. Be forewarned though, it is easy to get sidetracked with all the interesting historical information offered in an easy to read and engaging style.

This will be the definitive reference work on the subject of clasps for some time to come. 4000 years of clasps surveyed, 32 historians consulted, 22 museums involved; 76 contributors, jewellers, artists and designers from 30 countries.

The only drawback, and it's a minor one, is that the book is only sold on the Editions Terracol web site. http://www.editions-terracol.com/en/arts-et-techniques/15-clasps-4000-years-of-fasteners-in-jewellery-english-version.html The book is well worth seeking out. Clasps deserves a place in the working library of every serious jeweler and metalsmith.



Florence Jewelry District

At First glance, it may seem that Los Angeles and Florence, Italy have nothing in common, but on closer inspection you'll see at least one thing in common...the jewelry center where most of the city's goldsmiths, stone setters, engravers, etc. have tiny little offices from which they work to support the professional jewelry designers of Florence. If you had the chance to attend the recent and very popular MASSC Downtown LA Jewelry Tour, then you have an idea of what I am talking about.

Last Fall during the Metalsmiths in Florence workshop, I had the chance to tour the "Jewelry District's behindthe-scenes" workings of Florence, after one of our workshop days.

Giovanni (the Florentine Master Goldsmith who is our instructor for the week) took me across the Ponte Vecchio and down a narrow alleyway to a small door with a simple stone sign that read "Casa Artigiana Dell'Orafo" (Craftsman House of the Goldsmith). The building itself is a former 15th century convent where the famous Medici family brought all the Florentine goldsmiths shops together.



Giovanni took me into many rooms of various engravers, stone setters, casters, etc...and introduced me as the "Crazy American" who wanted to see what they were doing. I tried to ask intelligent questions, but I stumbled along in my pathetic Italian and then they all made fun


of me, which by the way is meant to be taken as a compliment, I guess.... haha.

SIG Dips into Prismacolor on Metal / Diane Weimer



Creating color on metal was our aim when we decided to use Prismacolor pencils and pens for our February MASSC SIG (special interest group) meeting at my studio in Long Beach, CA. Getting together was the toughest problem we faced for this meet. Usually we meet second Tuesday of the month.... But this time it didn't work out, so I thought well let's do it 2nd Wed.... Little did I think about Valentine's Day which wiped out half of our group (no Chalie Warner or David Keith, Ruth Shapiro, Trish McAleer or LaVerne Christenson). So, Angela Roskelley, Toni Federe, Susan Walter and I had a great time using the Prismacolor pencils and pens.

The group came with their metal already painted with Gesso. Those who still needed to do that used a heat gun to dry it. Susan used the gray Gesso, I used the white one. Then we sand a little with a fine sanding block which you can find in any nail salon.

My next step was to put my design on my piece using a yellow pencil. I then used the Prismacolor black pen to trace around the outline of my design. Once done I filled in with the Prismacolor pencils. I was careful not to smear the black pen as

I added my color. My next step was to go back in and do a little shading and highlighting with the colored pens.

Susan worked on her cats and Toni was making a pastel panel to use in a book and I was decorating my ravens. Toni was intent on blending her pencils and used an agate burnisher. Once done I sprayed it with Workable Fixative and NIkolas Lacquer.
